Birsl, Ursula, PhD, is a social scientist and Professor for Political Science with focus on Democracy Studies at the Department for Political Science, Philipps-University Marburg in Germany. Her main research interests are comparative studies of political rules, democracy in European and North American migration societies, right-wing extremism/terrorism and gender in Germany. Kerner, Ina, PhD, is Assistant Professor for Diversity Politics at Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin, Germany, and currently serves as HEC Foreign Professor at the Center of Excellence in Gender Studies at Quaid-i-Azam University in Islamabad. Her research interests include contemporary political and social theory (particularly feminist and postcolonial theories) and questions of diversity and intersectionality. Mehmood, Awais is Assistant Professor of Philosophy in the Department of Philosophy at Government MAO College and National College of Arts Lahore. He received his MA in Post-Colonial Resistance from GC University Lahore. His research areas and specialisation are Wittgenstein's philosophy of Language and the works of Homi Bhabha and Gayatri Spivak.

Akhtar, Aasim Sajjad, PhD, is Assistant Professor for Political Economy and Sociology at the National Institute of Pakistan Studies, Quaid-i-Azam University, Islamabad. In 2008 he completed his PhD in Political Sociology at the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London, United Kingdom, and taught as Teaching Fellow at the Department of Social Sciences, Lahore University of Management Sciences. His current research interests include identity formation, social movements and informal economy. Kakar, Ashraf is active in the All-Pakistan Alliance for Katchi Abadis and has more than ten years of experience in research, communication, media productions and management of public campaigns. He holds an academic background in anthropology, sociology, and media production and worked with public sector institutions, including the National College of Arts, Quaid-i-Azam University and Pakistan Television Corporation (PTV), as well as NGOs, Institute of Development Studies & Practices (IDSP) in Quetta and Society for Alternative Media & Research (SAMAR). Further, Ashraf has worked for different donor agencies, including the UN Fund for Children (UNICEF), Royal Norwegian Embassy (RNE), Danish Embassy, OXFAM NOVIB and Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung (FES) in Pakistan,

Afghanistan and the USA.

Mawaz, Amna is a political activist of the Awami Workers Party and associated with the All-Pakistan Alliance for Katchi Abadis. Moreover, she is a Bharat Natyam Dancer. She has been involved in classic dance for 13 years. As a feminist she uses her dance to highlight the plight of women, especially working class women in Pakistan. Amna did her Masters from the National Institute of Pakistan Studies, Quaid-i-Azam University.

Waheed, Arslan is a MPhil student at the National Institute of Pakistan Studies, Quaidi-Azam University, where he submitted his thesis on development discourses and the urban poor, case study of the Capital Development Authority (CDA) and Slums of Islamabad (2015). His areas of interest are participatory democracy, urban development and gender questions, knowledge-based economy and education decentralisation, poverty reduction and sustainable development. Currently, Arslan Waheed is a Hanns Seidel Foundation Scholar for the research project *Resources and Nation-Building: Key Issues, Ideas and Challenges* and works on a thesis-related research paper.

Bokhari, Hasnain holds a PhD from Erfurt University, Germany, where he is a lecturer for Public Policy at Willy Brandt School of Public Policy. His research interests include government, social media in conflict situations and political communication. In the past he has worked on an intercultural exchange project at the Chair of Muslim Culture & Religious History at Erfurt University. The project focused on social media in Muslim Countries under the backdrop of civil unrest in Arab countries. Hasnain Bokhari also holds a MA in Public Policy from Erfurt University and is associated with the Centre for Development Informatics in Manchester University, UK.

Bari, Farzana, PhD, is the Founding Director of the Center of Excellence for Gender Studies at Quaid-i-Azam University, where she has established women's studies as an academic institution in Pakistan. She chairs the National Committee on Gender Studies set up by the Higher Education Commission (HEC) and holds a PhD in Sociology from University of Sussex, UK. Her doctoral thesis focused on women's employment and empowerment. She also is active in policy advocacy and advice on women's social, political and economic empowerment to government, civil society and international community. Currently, she is working on her forthcoming book, Women's Substantive Representation in Pakistani Politics.

Saar, Martin, PhD, is Professor of Political Theory at the Department of Political Science at Leipzig University. Before taking up the position in Leipzig, he was a visiting professor teaching political theory and social philosophy in Bremen, Hamburg, Berlin and Frankfurt. His areas of specialisation and teaching are contemporary political theory, political and social philosophy and the history of early modern and modern political thought (with focus on Spinoza, Nietzsche, Marx, Foucault, Critical Theory, Poststructuralism, and interdisciplinary research on collective memory, affect, ideology, political aesthetics, and power). Raza, Sami, PhD, is Assistant Professor at the Department of Political Science at the University of Peshawar.
